Then, as David says in the next verse (5) your face will be radiant, as you are more than a conqueror over those fears today!

TCWM, A Major Source of Kingdom Joy

Most people plan on being happy, but they are not happy. O sure, they have had happy moments, times of great joy, special events, and fun times. But for the most part, these moments do not last because they are temporal joys, focused on being happy in the world.

But there is another kind of joy: Kingdom joy. Kingdom joy is a unique joy that comes to those who are in Christ's Kingdom; it is a joy that comes to those who focus on and seek first Christ's kingdom. In Romans 14, the Apostle Paul wrote: "For the Kingdom of God is not a matter of eating and drinking, but of righteousness, peace, and joy in the Holy Spirit." In 1 Peter 1:8-9, the Apostle Peter writes to followers of Jesus Christ in the early church, "Though you have not seen him, you love him; and even though you do not see him now, you believe in him and are filled with an inexpressible and glorious joy, for you are receiving the goal of your faith, the salvation of your souls." Peter here writes of a powerful and wonderful joy — he says this joy is both *inexpressible* and *glorious*.

Only a few people discover this Kingdom joy. For example, you can experience temporal or earthly joy in many ways: watching sports on TV, finding an item on sale, chomping down on a piece of steak or a piece of chocolate, or going on vacation. These are OK, but if that is all there is to your joy, then you have yet to discover Kingdom joy. If that is the extent of your joy, then you are still living as if you were a permanent resident of earth.

In contrast, Kingdom joy is your heart's response to what God has done and is doing in the world.

Kingdom joy is experienced by those who live on earth but are mindful that they are citizens of something that is much, much bigger. Kingdom joy is for people who understand that they are aliens, pilgrims, temporary residents, and short-timers on Earth. Their hopes and dreams are not tied up with everything on this earth. Their hearts are not focused on building an earthly kingdom, accumulating, and maintaining more stuff. Their focus is not on their temporal comfort or plans.

To develop a Kingdom heart and mind, to discover Kingdom joy, you must make a major shift. You see, God does not want your primary source of joy to come from things on CNN or Fox News or what is happening in politics in America.

Kingdom joy is for those who study the Bible and then look at the world and discover what God is doing in the nations. Kingdom joy is for the global Christian. And what is our Christ doing in this world? He has one great commission. He has sent us to make disciples, to work for the eternal Kingdom.

As I think of TCWM, I smile, and I am filled with joy at the great things God is doing. I am glad to give to a ministry that has eternal value, especially as I see seminaries and churches planted, individuals coming to Christ, and a growing army of disciples of Jesus Christ. I rejoice when I listen to KTR Radio in Uganda and when I see orphans and widows being cared for.
